CALL TO ORDER

Mayor Ervin called the April 12, 2021 regular meeting of Florence City Council to order at 1:05 p.m.

INVOCATION

Mayor Ervin gave the invocation for the meeting. The pledge of allegiance to the American Flag followed the invocation.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Pro tem Jebaily made a motion to adopt the minutes of the March 8, 2021 Regular City Council meeting and Councilwoman Barnes seconded the motion. The minutes were unanimously adopted.

ADDENDUM TO THE AGENDA

<u>Resolution No. 2021-10</u> A Resolution to proclaim March 25, 2021 as Greek Independence Day.



Pro tem Jebaily made a motion to add Resolution No. 2021-10 to the April 12, 2021 meeting agenda and Councilwoman Moore seconded the motion, which carried unanimously (7-0).

Pro tem Jebaily made a motion to adopt Resolution No. 2021-10 and Councilwoman Moore seconded the motion.

Pro tem Jebaily presented the Resolution to Mr. Jimmy Tassios, a representative of the Greek community in Florence.

Council voted unanimously (7-0) to adopt Resolution No. 2021-10.

MAYOR PRO TEMPORE GEORGE JEBAILY

Pro tem Jebaily spoke on the Mayor Pro Tempore position and said when he was elected to the Pro tem position in December, Councilman Schofield and Councilman Braddock were not present on the Council to represent District One and District Three. Pro tem Jebaily asked for their opinion on the matter. Mayor Ervin called a point of order, stating this item is not on the agenda for discussion as the public has not been properly notified. She said he can discuss the matter with the Councilmen outside the meeting and it can be added to next month's agenda if necessary.

APPEARANCE BEFORE COUNCIL

Mr. Irby Wilson, Pee Dee Coalition

Mr. Irby Wilson spoke to Council on Sexual Assault Awareness and Child Abuse Prevention month and services that are provided by the Coalition.

Councilman Braddock asked if the Coalition has seen an increase in numbers since COVID-19. Mr. Irby replied they have. Children have been out of school and it has resulted in an increase of child abuse cases. Councilman Braddock asked if funding has been made available through the CARES Act. He said they have received funding from the CARES Act, but they've also received cuts from the Victims of Crime Act.

Councilwoman Moore said she appreciates all the hard work the coalition is doing for the community.

Ms. Samantha Siegel, South Carolina Oceana Representative

Ms. Siegel appeared before Council to speak on single use plastics and their impact on the environment. Ms. Siegel said passing policies to reduce single use plastics is the most effective way to stop the flow into communities. She said 18 other South Carolina cities and towns have passed ordinances to reduce the use of plastics in their communities and asked Council to consider taking action to combat plastic litter in Florence.

PUBLIC HEARING

A public hearing will be held to receive input on the City of Florence Community Block Grant Budget for fiscal year 2021-2022.

Mayor Ervin opened the public hearing at 1:37 p.m.



Mr. Jerry Dudley, Planning Director, reported in order to be eligible under the current CDBG Program Descriptions, projects must meet one of the following three national objectives: benefit low and moderate income persons; aid in the prevention or eliminations of slums or blight; and meet a need having a particular urgency. For FY 2021-22 the city will receive \$291,200.

CDBG monies have historically be used for redevelopment projects and down payment assistance. Subrecipients that have previously been funded with CDBG funds include Manna house, My Brother's Keeper, etc.

The proposed CDBG Budget for FY 2021-22 is as follows:

A virtual Public Hearing was held on March 4, 2021 regarding the CDBG budget to allow participation from the community. Requests received during the public meetings include: creating a community center/playground for teens/children on the southeast side of Florence; continuation of removing blighted/abandoned properties in the city; renovations to Levy Park Community Center; litter, trash, and debris pickup through the city; continuation for home rehab and repairs; faster service in repairing broken water mains and clogged storm drains; drainage problems in Northwest Florence; sidewalk extension on W. Sumter St. Cashua; assistance form homeless and their vaccinations; economic development training or incentives; addressing potholes and neighborhood lighting; continuation of down-payment assistance for home purchases; and examination of water bills.

In previous years, the CDBG budget has included sub-recipients Lighthouse Ministries, Manna House, My Brother's Keeper and Salvation Army as part of the public service portion. Due to COVID-19, these sub-recipients were funded more substantially through CARES Act monies than they would have been under normal funding; therefore, staff is recommending these funds go towards down payment assistance and/or emergency rehabilitation.

Councilwoman Moore asked about the funding for the Barnes Street Activity Center and the Levy Park Youth Center. Mr. Dudley replied that is included in the Section 108 Loan Repayment and will be repaid in 3 years. Councilwoman Moore said the CDBG funding has continued to decrease over the years and asked if the city expects it to continue to decrease over the coming years. Mr. Scotty Davis, Deputy City Manager, approached the podium and said for approximately the last 10 years, the city has been told each



year that the program will be cut from funding so there is no way to know if funding will be available each year.

Mayor Ervin inquired on the Planning and Administration line item within the CDBG budget. Mr. Davis said the city is allowed 20% from the total amount (\$291,200) to go towards planning and administration, but for several years now this money has been going towards neighborhood redevelopment from the direction of Council.

There being no public comment, Mayor Ervin closed the public hearing at 1:45 p.m.

ORDINANCES IN POSITION

Bill No. 2021-06 - Second Reading

An Ordinance to replace the existing Emergency Ordinance No. 2021-07 and to extend emergency measures put in place previously by Emergency Ordinance No. 2020-28, which consolidated Emergency Ordinance Nos. 2020-12, 2020-13 and 2020-20 in response to the COVID-19 emergency.

Councilwoman Moore made a motion to adopt Bill No. 2021-06 on second reading and Pro tem Jebaily seconded the motion.

Council voted unanimously (7-0) to adopt Bill No. 2021-06.

Councilwoman Moore asked Mayor Ervin to explain to the public the purpose of this ordinance. Mayor Ervin said this ordinance will extend the use of face coverings in public spaces.

Councilman Braddock asked when this ordinance will expire. Mayor Ervin said the mask ordinance will continue until further notification, but it can be terminated by either action from the Governor or City Council.

Bill No. 2021-07 - Second Reading

An Ordinance to annex and zone the parcel located at 1541 Palomar Parkway, identified as Florence County Tax Map Parcel 90113-01-067.

Councilwoman Moore made a motion to adopt Bill No. 2021-07 on second reading and Councilwoman Barnes seconded the motion.

Council voted unanimously (7-0) to adopt Bill No. 2021-07.

Bill No. 2021-09 - Second Reading

An Ordinance to rezone the parcel located at 607 Second Loop Road, identified as Florence County Tax Map Parcel 90079-03-008.

Councilman Schofield made a motion to adopt Bill No. 2021-09 on second reading and Councilwoman Barnes seconded the motion.

Council voted unanimously (7-0) to adopt Bill No. 2021-09.

An Ordinance to amend the budget for the City of Florence, South Carolina, for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2020 and ending June 30, 2021.

Councilwoman Moore made a motion to pass Bill No. 2021-10 on first reading and Councilwoman Barnes seconded the motion.

Mr. Kevin Yokim, Assistant City Manager, reported there are several projects that were budgeted within last year's fiscal year budget in the water and sewer construction fund that were not completed; therefore, any available funding went into unappropriated reserves. Staff desires to bring the funds back to the water and sewer construction fund in this fiscal year's budget in order to continue work on the projects.

Council voted unanimously to pass Bill No. 2021-10 on first reading.

Mr. Davis reported the city has been diligent in ensuring all citizens are treated fairly and equitable regarding housing. The city has worked with a number of agencies, including the Board of Realtors, and has provided training to realtors, as well as landlords and tenants.

Council voted unanimously (7-0) to adopt Resolution No. 2021-08.

Bill No. 2021-08 - First Reading

An Ordinance to rezone three parcels located at 900 Oakland Avenue and 607 Maxwell Street, identified as Florence County Tax Map Parcels 90114-130001. 90114-13-002, and 90114-13-013.

Mayor Ervin acknowledged Mr. Patel, the applicant who connected to the meeting through Zoom. Mr. Patel reiterated their intent for the property, which is to demolish the current building and construct a new convenience store. He further stated they are willing to sign an agreement that states their intent.

Mayor Ervin thanked Mr. Patel for working with the city and being patient on this process. She said Council has had extensive conversation regarding the request to rezone and they want to ensure they decision made will create an end product that will benefit the community.

Pro tem Jebaily said he appreciates the interest in investment in this area that is historically depressed and it is Council's desire to ensure this is looked at comprehensively; therefore, Pro tem Jebaily made a motion for staff to prepare for Council possible modifications and amendments to the Unified Development Ordinance regarding the Conditional Uses within the city's zoning designations. The motion was seconded by Councilwoman Moore, which carried unanimously (7-0).

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE BUDGET FOR THE CITY OF FLORENCE, SOUTH CAROLINA, FOR THE FISCAL YEAR BEGINNING JULY 1, 2020, AND ENDING JUNE 30, 2021

BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of Florence, South Carolina, in a meeting duly assembled and by the authority thereof that the budget for the City of Florence, South Carolina, for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2020, and ending June 30, 2021, is hereby amended as follows:

Section 1. That the category of revenues of the Water and Sewer Construction Fund in said budget is hereby amended by the additional appropriations as follows:

220375-435010 From Unappropriated Reserve is increased in the amount of \$1,320,400 from Unassigned Fund Balance to appropriate monies for additional water and sewer construction projects.

Section 2. That the category of expenditures of the Water & Sewer Construction Fund in said budget is hereby amended by the additional appropriations as follows:





Request to amend the Planned Development District (PDD 2016-01) for the Grove at Ebenezer to reduce front setback requirement for Phase III and future single-family detached residential to 15ft.

II. CURRENT STATUS/PREVIOUS ACTION TAKEN:

- (1) PDD 2016-01 was created in May 2016 per Ordinance 2016-16 and entered into a development agreement as outlined in Ordinance 2016-17. Ordinance 2018-27 was later adopted to reduce the setbacks for the townhome development within a portion of The Grove Subdivision.
- (2) The currently proposed PDD amendment requests a reduction in the front setback requirement for single-family detached homes and was unanimously (7-0) recommended by the Planning Commission on April 13, 2021. At the same meeting, Planning Commission approved the proposed sketch plan for the Grove Phase III contingent upon approval of this PDD amendment.

III. POINTS TO CONSIDER:

- (1) This matter is before City Council for first reading.
- (2) The property is zoned Planned Development District (PDD) and is reviewed per the development guidelines of PDD 2016-01, which allows front setbacks of 20 ft for single-family detached homes.
- (3) The Developer is requesting an amendment to The Grove PDD to permit 15 ft front setbacks for Phase III and future single-family detached residential development. This request is based on space constraints due to stormwater infrastructure, utility rights-of-way, and a future addition to the City's Rail Trail system.
- (4) City staff recommends the proposed PDD amendment to reduce the front setback for singlefamily detached homes to 15 feet for Phase III and future phases of development. This reduced setback would not extend to include Phases I and II of The Grove Subdivision.





- D. Some municipalities, including the City of Columbia, City of Georgetown, and Town of Irmo have recognized the observance of this holiday and close municipal offices.

A RESOLUTION TO DESIGNATE JUNETEENTH, JUNE 19 AS AN OFFICIAL HOLIDAY FOR THE CITY OF FLORENCE

- WHEREAS, Juneteenth celebrates the end of slavery in the United States, and is also known as Emancipation Day, Juneteenth Independence Day, and Black Independence Day; and
- WHEREAS, President Abraham Lincoln decreed the Emancipation Proclamation on January 1, 1863. The proclamation declared "that all persons held as slaves" "are, and henceforward shall be free," but was limited only to enslaved people in the Confederacy, and to those in states that remained loyal to the Union; and,
- WHEREAS, news of the signing of the Emancipation Proclamation was withheld in parts of the United States for two and one half years, only reaching authorities and African-Americans in the South and Southwestern United States, where more than 250,000 enslaved people learned they had been freed, on June 19, 1865; and,
- WHEREAS, although the Emancipation Proclamation was issued on January 1, 1863, many slave owners continued to hold their slaves captive after the announcement, so the June 19, 1865 announcement became a symbolic date representing African American freedom known as Juneteenth; and,
- WHEREAS, Juneteenth is the oldest known celebration honoring the end of slavery in the United States, and was officially declared a state holiday in Texas in 1980, and several other states subsequently followed suit; and,
- WHEREAS, racial injustice and violence toward African-American citizens have resulted in national protests, demonstrations, and a unification of voices crying out for judicial racial reform.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FLORENCE, SOUTH CAROLINA, IN MEETING DULY ASSEMBLED:

June 19, Juneteenth, is hereby recognized as an official holiday for the City of Florence.

| WHEREAS, | throughout his career, Judge Guile made tireless contributions to the city's safety and growth by fostering equity and justice among its citizens; and |
| WHEREAS, | Judge Guile gave a lifetime of service to Florence and was a well-respected leader in the Florence community; his love for people and community growth and development was endless. |
