## CALL TO ORDER

Mayor Ervin called the May 9, 2022 regular meeting of Florence City Council to order at 1:00 p.m.

### **INVOCATION**

Mayor Ervin gave the invocation for the meeting. The pledge of allegiance to the American Flag followed the invocation.

## APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Councilman Schofield made a motion to adopt the minutes of the April 11, 2022 regular meeting and Councilwoman Barnes seconded the motion. The minutes were unanimously adopted.

### APPEARANCE BEFORE COUNCIL

### **Reverend Leo Woodberry**

Reverend Leo Woodberry, Executive Director of New Alpha CDC, and Mr. Anthony Hall appeared before Council to provide an update on cease fire zones in the City. Mr. Hall provided a statement to Council and asked for more immediate action on escalating gun violence in Florence. Several months ago, a recommendation was made to the City to establish cease fire zones on city property to reduce gun violence. A city-wide rally will be held on May 14, 2022 at 10:00 a.m. to call for the establishment of cease fire zones as well as the establishment of a stakeholders group. Proposed solutions are interconnective video cameras with gunfire noise activation and toolkits designed to train and educate the community.

Several Councilmembers thanked Reverend Woodberry for his continued efforts on this issue. City and County police departments are working, and action is being taken to address this issue and it will take community involvement to combat gun violence. Councilman McCall mentioned some legalities with establishing cease fire zones in South Carolina and asked Reverend Woodberry if any other cities in South Carolina have established such zones. Reverend Woodberry replied he was not aware of any SC cities, but he had hopes Florence could take the lead on this issue. Councilman McCall said he would like to further discuss the legalities of cease fire zones with the city attorney and mentioned a similar initiative out of the City of Columbia. Mayor Ervin spoke and also thanked Reverend Woodberry for his efforts. She said the City has established a Community Development Corporation and encouraged Reverend Woodberry to meet with this CDC so they can partner together.

## Ms. Charlotte Smith and Dr. Wendy Richardson

Ms. Charlotte Smith, representing Jeffries Creek Association of Neighbors, and Dr. Wendy Richardson, representing Briggs Neighborhood Watch, appeared before Council to speak on an Irby Street development project. Ms. Smith spoke first, saying she and her husband chose Florence to raise their family but questioned if her children would want to return to Florence and raise their children. Florence is



poised for growth, but people aren't going to stay in Florence unless a community is created where their families can thrive. She said City Councilmembers and staff have met with and spoken with the community, but she feels like everyone is being reactive. She mentioned the comprehensive plan and asked if it truly directs future growth and development in the city. The current comprehensive plan's future land use identifies the area between Irby Street and Gully Branch as Parks and Open Space. She questioned how building two high-density housing units is implementing the vision of parks and open space. In the upcoming months, City Council will be given the opportunity to act on behalf of the citizens in considering the adoption of a new Comprehensive Plan. She implored Council to be proactive and think about future growth and how zoning designations will affect the whole community. The City should commit to protecting its natural resources and ecosystems and be proactive in the decisions made with development to create space for organic community growth.

Dr. Wendy Richardson spoke next and presented Council with a petition by the Jeffries Creek Association of Neighbors and the Briggs Neighborhood Watch. The petition is attached to and made part of the minutes as **Attachment "A**". These groups are petitioning to end the planning and further development of the Indigo Townes Development, Phase 2 and 3, as well as any future planned or proposed multifamily developments located between Gully Branch and Irby Street for the reasons indicated on **Attachment "A**".

Dr. Richardson quoted the purpose of the Jefferies Creek Protection Overlay District as notated in the Unified Development Ordinance: "the City seeks to regulate and control development activities adjacent to Jeffries Creek within the City Limits of Florence. The City further seeks to preserve the Jeffries Creek floodway in order to protect and improve the water quality, scenic beauty, and wildlife habitat of the creek". Gully Branch and Jefferies Creek have an established history of flooding and pollution. Records from City Council minutes from 1989 notate that this very issue was brought before City Council. Between 2018-2022, residents in this area have made a total of 133 sewer backup calls to the City. Additionally, FEMA maps indicate the level of flood risk in this area as "unknown" due to its maps not being updated, this alone should halt any development. There is a total of six Low Income Housing Tax Credit (LIHTC) applications in Florence for 2022, more than any other city in the state. Dr. Richardson questioned why Florence is a target and suggested it may be due to excessive growth of rental properties in Florence and a downward decline in homeownership.

Dr. Richardson then presented a series of solutions and action items for the City to consider: align the Comprehensive Plan and the UDO; rezone undeveloped areas bordering Jeffries Creek or its tributaries to prevent further environmental degradation; expand Jeffries Creek Overlay District; increase buffer requirements; add cumulative impact to UDO; solicit public comment early and forward comments to appropriate city entities; consult Florence One Schools; require impact studies, no items of public interest in June and July; and establish environmental oversight commission to oversee proposed development adjacent to or in woodland/wetland areas.

Pro tem Jebaily said this is a city-wide issue and involves the environment, long-term planning and purposeful and intentional planning. He thanked the community for all the research done on this issue.

Mayor Ervin said the City is being proactive to get things in place and suggested that Dr. Richardson contact the City's Resilience and Sustainability Advisory Committee since this committee is tasked with looking at issues such as these.



## Mr. Chris Handley

Mr. Chris Handley, Executive Director of Helping Florence Flourish, appeared before Council to speak on appropriations for Helping Florence Flourish. Mr. Handley said Helping Florence Flourish is in the business of restoring and has recently partnered to build a home. They've become aware of structures and homes in various stages of disrepair with property owners having no funds to make the necessary repairs. He asked that Council consider appropriating funds in the amount of \$25,000 to allow Helping Florence Flourish the opportunity to make repairs to homes in the community within the next year.

Mayor Ervin encouraged Mr. Handley to reach out to the Community Development Corporation for a partnership. There are various organizations that have a similar mission in the community, and it will be beneficial if all these groups collaborate to bring their resources together, similar to how the No One Unsheltered organization was formed to assist the homeless. Councilwoman Barnes spoke in favor of considering this request as Helping Florence Flourish has helped to transform the community and has assisted multiple people and families. Pro tem Jebaily requested a plan be put in place and how funding will fit into the plan. Mr. Handley said they are just in the beginning of the planning phase, but they hope to begin work in October. The number of projects they can complete will be dependent on the amount of funding they have to work with. Councilwoman Moore also spoke in favor of considering the request and commended Mr. Handley and Helping Florence Flourish for their work with the community.

### Mr. Frank Williams

Mr. Frank Williams, basketball coach, appeared before Council to speak on rental fees at Pearl Moore Basketball Center. Mr. Williams said he has been having issues trying to find a gym to work with the youth because the fees are high at \$40-50 per hour. He mentioned that adults have access to the gym on certain days for free for activities such as pickle ball and asked what can be done for the youth. He does volunteer work with the youth and does not like to charge them, and many parents cannot afford to pay these fees.

Councilman McCall asked how the rental fees were chosen. Mr. Randy Osterman, City Manager, said the fee covers operational costs associated with personnel, utilities, insurance, etc. and is not intended to make money. Councilman McCall asked if the fee has always been \$50 or if it increased over time. Mr. Chuck Pope, Public Works Director, took the podium and said the fee started around \$40-45 since the City began allowing outside use (programming other than City programming). The facility does offer free play nights for adults to utilize the gym at no cost. Over the years, the number of traveling teams has increased and they are all looking for space. The City's summer basketball program runs June through July and December through March in the winter program. The fees are presented to the Parks Commission in order to keep them at a minimum. Mr. Williams asked if coaches could get a discounted rental rate and Mr. Pope said this has been discussed and it may be that the fee can get reduced for Florence groups that need space; however, he understands that each person that participates in a travel program pays, either by sponsorship or out of pocket, for their participation.

Councilwoman Barnes asked why Pearl Moore's name isn't displayed on the outside of the building. Mr. Pope responded it is prominently displayed as you enter the building. Mr. Pope said staff has discussed placing signage along Barnes Street listing the various facilities on site. Ms. Pearl Moore approached the podium and suggested the City offer a flat rate instead of a by the hour rate for rental.

Councilwoman Moore said the gym was built for basketball and volleyball and asked why pickle ball is always there. She said she is disturbed by the amount of the rental fee and agreed a flat fee may work to help those volunteering their time. Mr. Pope said all the suggestions given today will be considered.



Mayor Ervin said the City may need to look at ending all programming not associated with Basketball at the gym. The Pearl Moore Gymnasium was built to focus on basketball and to be utilized primarily by City basketball programs. Outside programs need to understand the city's position in covering operating costs and the City can look at ways to balance the two. Concerns on the hours of operation for the Barnes Street Community Center were also brought up and Mayor Ervin asked that staff evaluate the summer hours for the center.

### PUBLIC HEARING

# A Public Hearing to receive input on the City of Florence Community Block Grant Budget for fiscal year 2022-2023.

Mayor Ervin opened the public hearing at 3:15 p.m.

Mr. Jerry Dudley, Planning Director, reported the City receives annual allocations for the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds. The City has not heard what the allocations will be yet for this year; however, staff desired to move forward with a series of public hearings to gain input from the community on how the funds should be spent. It is anticipated the funding will go before Council in the form of a Resolution at their June meeting. CDBG funding can only be used to meet three national objectives: aid in the elimination of slum and blight; benefit to low-moderate income persons; and meeting a need having urgency.

A public hearing was held on May 31<sup>st</sup> and input was received from several community members. Staff in the Community Services Department also attended several neighborhood meetings to gain input from those community members.

There being no one present to speak, Mayor Ervin closed the public hearing at 3:16 p.m.

### **ORDINANCES IN POSITION**

### No. 2022-09 - Second Reading

Councilman McCall made a motion to adopt Bill No. 2022-09 on second reading and Councilman Braddock seconded the motion.

Council voted unanimously (7-0) to adopt Bill No. 2022-09.

### Bill No. 2022-11 - Second Reading

An Ordinance to amend Chapter 4 Article XIV of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Florence entitled "Single-Family and Multi-Family Residential Rental Housing Registration".

Councilman Braddock made a motion to adopt Bill No. 2022-11 on second reading and Councilwoman Moore seconded the motion.

Council voted unanimously (7-0) to adopt Bill No. 2022-11.



### INTRODUCTION OF ORDINANCES

### Bill No. 2022-04 - First Reading

## An Ordinance to rezone from NC-6.2 to NC-6.3 the parcel located at 706 Norfolk Street; identified as Florence County Tax Map Parcel 90100-03-001.

Mayor Ervin stated the applicant has requested to withdraw this item from the agenda. Without objection, this item was withdrawn from the agenda.

### Bill No. 2022-07 - First Reading

## An Ordinance to rezone from PDD to AC a portion of the parcel located on Second Loop Road; identified as Florence County Tax Map Parcel 90030-02-007.

Mayor Ervin stated the applicant has requested to withdraw this item from the agenda. Without objection, this item was withdrawn from the agenda.

### Bill No. 2022-12 - First Reading

An Ordinance to annex and zone CG the parcel located at 3648 South Irby Street and identified as Florence County Tax Map Parcel 00152-01-029.

Mayor Ervin stated the applicant has requested to withdraw this item from the agenda. Without objection, this item was withdrawn from the agenda.

### Bill No. 2022-13 - First Reading

## An Ordinance to rezone from NC-15 to NC-6.3 the parcel located at 2150 Fernleaf Drive and identified as Florence County Tax Map Parcel 90018-07-003.

Councilman Schofield made a motion to pass Bill No. 2022-13 on first reading and Councilwoman Barnes seconded the motion.

Mr. Dudley reported the proposed zoning of NC-6.3 will allow for multi-family residential as opposed to single-family residential with its current zoning. At the March Planning Commission meeting, the Neighborhood Association for Country Club Forest brought forth protective covenants for the neighborhood, to include this parcel. The protective covenants only allow construction of single-family detached homes. The Planning Department does not typically enforce restrictive covenants; however, when presented knowledge of protective covenants that would prohibit the proposed activity, zoning permits may not be issued unless permission has been given by the association or court order. No such permission has been given for this property at this time. Based on this information, Planning Commission voted 6-0 to not recommend the rezoning request.

Council voted unanimously (7-0) to deny the rezoning request.

### Bill No. 2022-14 - First Reading

# An Ordinance to rezone from NC-6.1 to NC-6.2 the parcel located at 1309 West Dixie Street and identified as Florence County Tax Map Parcel 90044-01-005.

Councilwoman Barnes made a motion to pass Bill No. 2022-14 on first reading and Councilman Schofield seconded the motion.



Mr. Dudley reported the current zoning permits single family detached homes only. The proposed zoning of NC-6.2 permits duplexes in addition to single family detached homes. Properties to the west of this lot are of duplex development, although they would not meet current code. Properties to the east are characterized by single family development as well as a church.

Planning Commission voted unanimously, 6-0 to deny this rezoning request in order to maintain the limitation to single family uses in this district.

Mayor Ervin said some individuals have signed-in to speak on this item. Ms. Mariscia Cooper spoke in opposition to the rezoning and spoke of pride in her neighborhood. The neighborhood needs more homeownership instead of rentals and the focus should be to improve what is already existing. She said the community met with the developers of the multi-family housing project and gave them a chance; however, they can only receive the tax credit with a specific type of housing, and it is not what the community needs.

Ms. Jean Zollicoffer spoke next and expressed opposition to the rezoning. The community does not need more rental units, the community wants homeownership so they have something to leave their children. She shared some concerns from the community regarding traffic, safety, and parking. There is a traffic problem with large trucks to and from Vulcraft driving through the neighborhood to get to Cashua and Darlington Streets, and there are frequent traffic jams at the ends of various streets. The surges of traffic in the mornings and evenings impacts the safety of children walking to and from bus stops because the neighborhood is without sidewalks. There is not adequate parking for people living in the duplexes, so they end up parking on the street.

Several Councilmembers spoke on the Dixie Street rezoning, as well as the proposed Harmony Street multi-family development. Pro tem Jebaily said the Business Development Committee has begun to comprehensively look at the housing issues occurring in Florence right now and will potentially be conducting a housing study or housing program to evaluate these issues. The City must abide by the Fair Housing Act, but there must be some compelling reasons for City Council to change zoning away from single-family.

Councilman McCall said he is a product of affordable housing and spoke of the dignity individuals feel just to have their own place. He is in favor of not doing anything that would desecrate a neighborhood; however, he is not in favor of stopping every affordable housing project across the City. People that live in affordable housing are often voiceless and he will work to protect them. There is an affordable housing issue and where they should be located needs to be studied. Changing zoning away from single-family in a residential neighborhood is also something he is not in favor of.

Councilwoman Moore said the rent is just as high in these units as it is to own a home and the rentals are only destroying the neighborhood. She will never be an advocate to change zoning in this area.

Councilman McCall said Ms. Cooper mentioned at the Northwest community meeting that a major development in this area has not occurred in over 50 years from private developers. It just happens to be that the first proposed development is a multi-family complex. Council needs to look at way to help development in this area, otherwise developers will have no interest at all.

Mayor Ervin said the City hired a consultant, APD, and developed the Neighborhood Revitalization Plan in 2014 with a focus on three catalytic areas: North Florence, Northwest Florence, and East Florence. This plan addresses many of Council's current concerns and indicates what types of projects/developments will thrive in these areas. Plans were developed and single-family homes began to



be constructed resulting in homeownership. Mayor Ervin said the plan is in place and has been since 2014, the City just needs to work the plan. Mayor Ervin called on Deputy City Manager, Scotty Davis, to elaborate. Mr. Davis said the City has been working on quality, single-family homes for decades and has completed studies. In traditional West Florence, the rental rate is 70%. The City has purchased lots throughout the years and began to build homes at a range of price points to help build the market up. The affordable housing plan is still in place and can be updated if needed.

Council voted unanimously (7-0) to deny the rezoning request.

### Bill No. 2022-15 - First Reading

### An Ordinance to abandon interest in property identified as "Parkway" adjacent to Florence County Tax Map Parcel 90037-03-013 and Mimosa Drive.

Pro tem Jebaily made a motion to pass Bill No. 2022-15 on first reading and Councilman Schofield seconded the motion.

Mr. Dudley reported the property proposed for abandonment is between Mimosa Drive and 907 Sherwood Drive. The request has been made by the property owner of 907 Sherwood Drive to allow a new driveway with access to Mimosa Drive. Mimosa Drive is a SCDOT maintained road requiring the property owner to have their permission for the driveway. SCDOT is unable to grant permission until the City abandons any interest it may have in the parcel.

A survey from 1947 shows the property in question as "parkway". The parkway seems to be a 5' wide pathway connecting pocket parks within the subdivision. Through the years, the pocket parks and sections of the connecting parkway have been combined with adjacent properties with few fragments of the original parkway remaining. If the property is abandoned by the City, the property can be conveyed to the adjacent property owner utilizing the quit-claim deed process, thus placing the property into private ownership.

Council voted unanimously (7-0) to pass Bill No. 2022-15.

### Bill No. 2022-16 - First Reading

# An Ordinance to amend the budget for the City of Florence, South Carolina, for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2021 and ending June 30, 2022.

Councilwoman Moore made a motion to pass Bill No. 2022-16 on first reading and Pro tem Jebaily seconded the motion.

Mr. Kevin Yokim, Assistant City Manager of Finance/Administration, reported there are three objectives for the proposed budget amendment: to appropriate funding for corridor improvements/motel property from funds received from McLeod Health and Drs. Bruce and Lee Foundation, to correct a scrivener's error in the original budget, and to amend the Water and Sewer Utilities Enterprise Fund budget to appropriate funding to transfer the property on Evans Street to a private developer to construct the various buildings for the Urban Square project.

Council voted unanimously (7-0) to pass Bill No. 2022-16.

### Bill No. 2022-17 - First Reading

An Ordinance to amend Section 9-20 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Florence entitled "Littering".



Councilman Schofield made a motion to pass Bill No. 2022-17 on first reading and Pro tem Jebaily seconded the motion.

Mr. Osterman reported the proposed amendments clarifies the responsibilities of property owners with litter containment on their properties and increases the fine from \$200 to \$500.

Council voted unanimously (7-0) to pass Bill No. 2022-17.

## PETITION TO STOP INDIGO TOWNES DEVELOPMENT PHASES 2 and 3 April 7, 2022

The Jeffries Creek Association of Neighbors and the Briggs Neighborhood Watch are hereby petitioning for an end to the planning and further development of the Indigo Townes Development Phases 2 and 3, as well as any future planned or proposed multifamily developments located between Gully Branch and Irby Street.

As tax-paying homeowners impacted by these development proposals and plans, we oppose Indigo Townes Development Phases 2 and 3 for the following reasons:

- WETLANDS: Continued construction endangers our local wetland and greenspace conservation. In the City of Florence Comprehensive Plan, Map 2.4 Future Land Use this area is designated as "Parks and Open Space."
- 2) INFRASTRUCTURE: As evidenced by the numerous sewage issues documented in our neighborhood, the City of Florence's current sewage/wastewater infrastructure system is not adequately handling current needs and is not equipped to handle the additional burdens of the proposed multi-family residential population increases in this area.
- 3) RUNOFF & FLOODING: The approval of the proposed developments risks increasing storm water runoff and flooding for surrounding residential areas that already suffer from flooding.
- 4) TRAFFIC: The continued development of multi-family housing in the same area will result in expanded roadway stresses and traffic management issues.
- 5) SCHOOLS: The proposed development is located within a single elementary school zone. The impact of the proposed population increases on that school, Briggs Elementary, has not been given consideration, since there was no engagement with the school district. Such a study is urgently warranted before multifamily construction in this area is considered since the impact of these large multifamily developments, added to those already existing, on the student capacity of the school, zoning, and transportation have not been considered.

According to the City of Florence's website, the City, acting through its Planning Department, and ultimately through its City Council, is charged with protecting our natural resources and the existing homeowners of Florence: "...its function is to guide growth and development in the City of Florence. It uses zoning to identify land uses to protect property values as well as both natural and built resources." The proposed Indigo Development Phases 2 and 3 do not fulfill that mission for the reasons stated above. The continued increase in multifamily development residences along our natural streams and on the periphery of a wellestablished neighborhood will only serve to increase water pollution, threaten property values of the adjacent neighborhood properties as the negative factors compound, compromise F1S' ability to provide a quality education to students due to over-crowding, and thereby negatively impact the overall quality of life for the residents of these neighborhoods.

# **OVERVIEW OF FY 2022-23 BUDGET**

Mr. Randy Osterman, City Manager, began by introducing the objectives of the FY 2022-23 General Fund Budget. In order to fund the Community Development Corporation (CDC) this fiscal year, the money must come from the fund balance (approximately \$1.2 million).

### **General Fund Budget Objectives:**

- Balanced Budget
- Remain within Current Revenues
- Meet Council Objectives
- Meet Service Delivery Needs
- Merit Increase for Employees
- Community Programs
- Community Development Corporation & Division

### **General Fund Budget Highlights:**

The following is a list of highlights from the FY 2022-23 General Fund Budget.

Initial budget requests were \$5,253,528 greater than revenue estimates. This shortfall was resolved through adjustments to capital requests, department operational requests, as well as adjustments based on attrition trend savings and delayed hiring. Job related vacancies and controlling expenditures have resulted in savings which will be used for a one-time purchase of auto and maintenance equipment ("early purchases").

### <u>FY 2022-23</u> General Fund Budget Highlights

- ▶ Initial budget requests were \$5,253,528 greater than revenue estimates
  - Shortfall resolved through:
    - Adjustments to capital requests
    - Adjustments based on attrition trend savings and delayed hiring
    - Adjustments to department operational requests
- ▶ FY 2022 job related vacancies and controlling expenditures have resulted in savings.



- ► FY 2022 anticipated savings will be used for:
  - One-time purchase of capital items
    - Auto Equipment
    - ► Maintenance Equipment

### **Compensation/Benefits Highlights:**

The following is a summary of FY 2022-23 compensation and benefits. January 1, 2023, the City's Health Insurance premium is projected to increase 18.1%, which is approximately a \$600,000 increase in the budget.

- Cost of Living and Merit pay increase eligibility effective January 1, 2023 included in the budget (approximately 3%).
- Annual Longevity Recognition Pay.
- Effective January 1, 2023, the City's Health Insurance premium is projected to increase 18.1% for the City with no increase for employees. The City maintained an experience rating of zero.
- Retirement System contribution increases for the City effective July 1, 2022:
  - ► SCRS: City contribution increases 1.00% (from 16.56% to 17.56%)
  - ▶ PORS: City contribution increases 1.00% (from 19.24% to 20.24%)

<u>Note</u>: The 1% increase above assumes that the 1 percent pension employer contribution credit in the FY 2022 State budget is funded at the same level in the FY 2023 State budget. If this credit is not included in the state budget, both the SCRS and the PORS contribution will increase by 2% instead of 1%.

Below are new positions proposed in the FY 2022-23 budget. The CDC Executive Director will be funded from the CDC's allotted money. The Police Cadet program is new and will prepare individuals to become Police Officer's once they turn 21 years of age. The Parks Groundskeeper positions are necessary with the expansion of facilities such as the athletic complex and the Lawton Chase House.

Mayor Ervin inquired on the CDL training program offered to employees and Mr. Osterman said the training is available but there are currently no employees interested in taking advantage of the program. The City has contracted with a CDL instructor and has offered sanitation workers the necessary training to become CDL licensed.

# **General Fund:**

Mr. Kevin Yokim, Assistant City Manager of Finance/Administration, began a presentation with the General Fund, the largest fund for the city. For the FY 2022-23 General Fund Budget, original expenditure requests were \$5,253,528 higher than the original revenue projections.

### Balancing the FY 2022-23 General Fund Budget

Original Revenue Projections: \$43,116,800 Original Expenditure Requests: \$48,370,328

### Difference: \$5,253,528 Final FY 2022-23 Balanced Budget \$44,910,000

The proposed budget assumes every position is funded every day of the year. Compensation and benefits cost reductions are projected at \$1,921,818. A deferred hiring schedule of 16 weeks and other compensation savings save the city \$1,725,831. Further projected savings are from positions funded beginning January 1, 2023 (\$41,429), and from positions proposed but not funded for 2022-23 (\$154,558).

Councilwoman Barnes inquired on the Foster Care Clothing Closet program. Mr. Yokim replied it is a non-profit program that provides support to foster families with children who have come into their care with little to no belongings.

### **Hospitality Fund**

This is the 2% tax paid on prepared food and beverage purchases in the city. The Hospitality Fund is one of the city's growth funds but it is also a restricted fund. South Carolina Code requires any revenue generated by the hospitality fee must be used exclusively for the following purposes:

- Tourism-related buildings including, but not limited to, civic centers, coliseums, and aquariums.
- > Tourism-related cultural, recreational, or historic facilities.
- Beach access and re-nourishment.
- > Highways, roads, streets, and bridges providing access to tourist destinations.
- > Advertisements and promotions related to tourism development.
- > Water and sewer infrastructure to serve tourism-related demand.

However, because at least \$900,000 in accommodations taxes are collected annually in Florence County, State law permits hospitality funds to be spent for operations related to the above stated purposes.

Pro tem Jebaily asked Mr. Moore to elaborate on the McQueen and Cedar Street project. Mr. Moore said a main trunk line runs down McQueen Street. It has been discovered that there is a lot of insufficient infrastructure that goes into Maple Park, Timrod Park and Cedar Street towards Irby Street and they are working to determine how to best move the water in these areas to the main trunk line.

# Utilities Equipment Replacement Fund

The Equipment Replacement Fund is a fund to replace utility equipment. This fund allows for the replacement of equipment when it is needed and does not require that the purchase be deferred.

# **DISCUSSION:**

Mr. Yokim said the City has recently contracted with a budgeting software company called OpenGov. He briefly went over some of the benefits of utilizing the new software and some notable changes in the appearance of the budget book.

Councilman Braddock said Council has been discussing options to incentivize development in the North Florence area and asked if there would be any revenue gains with these incentives. Mr. Osterman said it depends on how the incentives are established, but it will not be shown as a line item in the budget. Councilman Braddock asked which fund these would come from. Mr. Osterman said it would likely be the utility fund if water and sewer are part of the incentive program. Funding can be looked at as the program is established and may be able to be included in the mid-year budget. Pro tem Jebaily said he believes there are some legal restrictions in providing incentives and asked Mr. Peterson to elaborate. Mr. Peterson said there are legal restrictions on the use of public funds to incentive a private developer. An



economic feasibility analysis needs to be completed to show that the public benefit of the use of the money outweighs any private benefit, similar to the analysis that is currently completed for the downtown incentive program. Councilman McCall asked how much money is allocated to the downtown incentive program annually. Mr. Yokim said the amount fluctuates, but there is approximately \$1 million in the utility fund for items such as these.

Councilwoman Barnes inquired on the monies allocated for the demolition of homes. Mr. Osterman said those monies were allocated to the Community Services department through the American Rescue Act funds. The City has already received approximately thirty requests for demolition that must move through the process. The first four homes for demolition have been bid out and another four are still in the title research process. Many of the worst homes will require involvement from codes enforcement or court action in order to move forward with demolition.

Councilman Braddock questioned the \$177,000 cut from the Police Department's budget. Mr. Osterman replied nothing cut is detrimental to the department; many of the items were duplicate requests and the biggest non-capital item cut was a reduction in fuel expenses.

Mr. Osterman said several Councilmembers have inquired on how the CDC money is applied and said his assumption with the passing of the Resolution was that it would be a one-time distribution and asked Council if this assumption was correct. Mayor Ervin clarified that Council could allocate the funds to the CDC with guidelines, but once the funds are allocated and distributed to the CDC the City has no say on the use of the funds. The desire is to create a healthy CDC that can go after funding and grant opportunities so they can become independent of the City and not depend on its funding. Mr. Osterman clarified that the money up for discussion is the \$400,000 to be allotted to the CDC. \$100,000 of that money is for the salary and benefits of the Executive Director of the CDC, so the decision that needs to be made is how to apply the remaining \$300,000 to the CDC for programming. Mr. Peterson was asked to speak on any legal restrictions. It is important to remember the CDC is a separate entity from the City. The City committed to hiring a director for the CDC and provide the amount of funding needed to get the CDC going. Mr. Peterson said the money can be sent as a one-time distribution, quarterly, et cetera. Once the money is distributed, the City cannot tell the CDC how to spend the money; however, the City can require an accounting of the spending of the funds. The City may also ask the CDC to provide to the City Manager a budget of the proposed spending of the money. Councilman McCall asked if the City could make a recommendation to the CDC to use the money towards catalytic areas in Florence. Mr. Scotty Davis, Deputy City Manager, responded that information is included in the bylaws. Also in the bylaws is the requirement that the CDC make an annual report to City Council. Councilman McCall asked if staff has a recommendation on the distribution of the funds to the CDC. Mr. Osterman said they will follow the wishes of Council; however, there may be the desire to wait until an Executive Director is hired. The position has been posted and advertised. Mayor Ervin and Pro tem Jebaily spoke in favor of the recommendation. Based on a census of Council, the funds will be distributed upon the hire of an Executive Director.

**DATE:** May 9, 2022

AGENDA ITEM: An ordinance to abandon interest in property identified as "Parkway" adjacent to tax parcel 90037-03-013 and Mimosa Drive

### DEPARTMENT/DIVISION: Department of Planning, Research & Development

### I. ISSUE UNDER CONSIDERATION:

Abandonment of any City of Florence interest in a 5-foot wide approximately 50-foot long strip of land, specifically an unopened and undeveloped portion east of Mimosa Drive. The property is bounded on the north by an extension of the northern property line of 907 Sherwood Drive; on the south by a line perpendicular to Mimosa Drive at the northernmost corner of 904 Mimosa Drive; on the west by Mimosa Drive proper; and on the east by 907 Sherwood Drive.

#### **II. CURRENT STATUS/PREVIOUS ACTION TAKEN:**

On April 12, 2022, the City of Florence Planning Commission held a public hearing on this matter and voted unanimously 6-0 to recommend abandonment.

#### **III. POINTS TO CONSIDER:**

- (1) Request is being considered for first reading.
- (2) The request was made by the property owner of 907 Sherwood Drive. The owner would like access to Mimosa Drive via a new driveway. Mimosa Drive is a SCDOT maintained road requiring the property owner to have their permission for the driveway. SCDOT is unable to grant permission until the City abandons any interest it may have in the parcel.
- (3) Only the portion of undeveloped parcel adjacent to 907 Sherwood Drive is being proposed for abandonment.
- (4) A survey from 1947 shows the property in question as "parkway". The parkway seems to be a 5' wide pathway connecting pocket parks within the subdivision. Through the years, the pocket parks and sections of the connecting parkway have been combined with adjacent properties. A few fragments of the original parkway, including this one, remain.
- (5) The following City of Florence departments were contacted regarding the abandonment of the right-of-way: Fire; Police; Public Works; Utilities; and Planning, Research, and Development. None of the aforementioned departments found any reason to maintain the City's interest in this section of Mimosa Drive and no City of Florence utilities are present within the property.
- (6) If the property is abandoned by City Council, the property can be conveyed to adjacent property owner utilizing the quit-claim deed process, thus placing the property into private ownership.

THE PROPERTY IS BOUNDED ON THE NORTH BY AN EXTENSION OF THE NORTHERN PROPERTY LINE OF 907 SHERWOOD DRIVE; ON THE SOUTH BY A LINE PERPENDICULAR TO MIMOSA DRIVE AT THE NORTHERNMOST CORNER OF 904 MIMOSA DRIVE; ON THE WEST BY MIMOSA DRIVE PROPER; AND ON THE EAST BY 907 SHERWOOD DRIVE.

WHEREAS, a request has been made for the City to abandon its interest in property identified as "Parkway" adjacent to tax parcel 90037-03-013 and Mimosa Drive. 



# AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 9-20 OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF FLORENCE ENTITLED "LITTERING".

WHEREAS, the City of Florence commits to advancing efforts to ensure a safe, clean, litter free and habitable environment of all people throughout our community; and

WHEREAS, the current Section 9-20 is approximately thirty (30) years old and contains outdated provisions;

# NOW, THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FLORENCE IN MEETING DULY ASSEMBLED AND BY THE AUTHORITY THEREOF:

- That an Ordinance is hereby adopted to amend Section 9-20 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Florence entitled "Littering," and to replace said code section with a new code section entitled "Littering Prohibited; Removal; Penalties" which shall read in its entirety as set forth on Exhibit A hereto which is incorporated herein by reference;
- 2. That this Ordinance shall become effective upon its approval and adoption on second reading by the City Council of the City of Florence.

# EXHIBIT A

### Sec. 9-20. Littering Prohibited; Removal; Penalties.

- (a) No person shall dump, throw, drop, deposit, discard or otherwise dispose of litter or other solid waste upon any public property in the city or upon private property in this city or in the waters of this city whether from a vehicle or otherwise, including but not limited to any public highway, public park, campground, forest land, recreational area, trailer park, highway, road, street or alley except:
  - (1) When such property is designated by the city for the disposal of litter and other solid waste and such person is authorized to use such property for such purpose;
  - (2) Into a litter receptacle in such a manner that the litter will be prevented from being carried away or deposited by the elements upon any part of such private or public property or waters.
- (b) Persons with trash receptacles on their property shall be responsible for insuring that the receptacle is in a condition that prevents litter from being carried away or deposited by the elements upon any part of such private or public property or waters. When the receptacle fails to prevent the spread of litter or when the owner fails to empty the receptacle and thereby allows the spread of litter upon any part of private or public properties, the owner of the property upon which the receptacle is located shall be in violation of this ordinance. The removal of litter from property or receptacles shall be upon the owner of the property where the receptacle is located.
- (c) No person shall throw or place any refuse, paper, trash, glass, nails, tacks, wire, bottles, cans, yard trash, landscape waste, concrete, earthen fill, garbage, containers or litter or other debris in any ditch, stream, river, creek, pond, lagoon, channel, canal or retention basin that regularly or periodically carries surface water run-off.
- (d) Failure of any driver or operator of any motor vehicle to cover and secure any loose material which is being transported or hauled upon the streets or other rights-of-way in the city so as to cause such material to blow, fall, spill or drop and thereby litter any street or other property within the city shall constitute a violation of this section.
- (d) Any person violating the provisions of this section shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined not less than one hundred dollars (\$100.00) nor more than five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for each offense. The court, in lieu of any monetary fine imposed, may direct the substitution of litter-gathering labor under the supervision of the court, not to exceed one (1) hour for each five dollars (\$5.00) of fine imposed. In addition to any other punishment authorized by this section, in the sound discretion of any court in which conviction is obtained, such person may be directed by the judge to pick up and remove from any public place or any private property, with prior permission of the legal owner upon which it is established by competent evidence that such person had deposited litter, any or all litter deposited thereon by anyone prior to the date of execution of sentence.

# AN ORDINANCE TO RAISE REVENUE AND ADOPT A BUDGET FOR THE CITY OF FLORENCE, SOUTH CAROLINA, FOR THE FISCAL YEAR BEGINNING JULY 1, 2022, AND ENDING JUNE 30, 2023.

WHEREAS, § 5-7-260 of the South Carolina Code of Laws (as amended) requires that a Municipal Council shall act by ordinance to adopt budgets and levy taxes pursuant to public notice.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED** by the City Council of the City of Florence in Council duly assembled and by the authority of the same:

# Section 1

- (a) There is hereby adopted a General Fund budget for the City of Florence for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2022, and ending June 30, 2023, as filed in the office of the City Clerk which is hereby incorporated by reference as if set forth fully herein, providing for revenues and appropriations in a total amount of \$44,910,000.
- (b) Further, there is hereby adopted a General Fund Debt Service Fund budget for the City of Florence for fiscal year beginning July 1, 2022, and ending June 30, 2023, as filed in the office of the City Clerk which is hereby incorporated by reference as if set forth fully herein, providing for revenues and appropriations in the total amount of \$694,000.
- (c) Further, there is hereby adopted a Water and Sewer Utilities Enterprise Fund budget for the City of Florence for fiscal year beginning July 1, 2022, and ending June 30, 2023, as filed in the office of the City Clerk which is hereby incorporated by reference as if set forth fully herein, providing for revenues and appropriations in a total amount of \$39,610,000.
- (d) Further, there is hereby adopted a Water and Sewer Utilities Equipment Replacement Fund budget for the City of Florence for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2022, and ending June 30, 2023, as filed in the office of the City Clerk which is hereby incorporated by reference as if set forth fully herein providing for revenues and appropriations in the total amount of \$1,490,000.
- (e) Further, there is hereby adopted a Water and Sewer Utilities Construction Fund budget for the City of Florence for fiscal year beginning July 1, 2022, and ending June 30, 2023, as filed in the office of the City Clerk which is hereby incorporated by reference as if set forth fully herein, providing for revenues and appropriations in a total amount of \$11,983,000.

- (f) Further, there is hereby adopted a Stormwater Utility Enterprise Fund budget for the City of Florence for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2022, and ending June 30, 2023, as filed in the office of the City Clerk which is hereby incorporated by reference as if set forth fully herein providing for revenues and appropriations in the total amount of \$1,720,000.
- (g) Further, there is hereby adopted a Stormwater Utility Equipment Replacement Fund budget for the City of Florence for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2022, and ending June 30, 2023, as filed in the office of the City Clerk which is hereby incorporated by reference as if set forth fully herein providing for revenues and appropriations in the total amount of \$345,000.
- (h) Further, there is hereby adopted a Stormwater Utility Construction budget for the City of Florence for fiscal year beginning July 1, 2022, and ending June 30, 2023, as filed in the office of the City Clerk which is hereby incorporated by reference as if set forth fully herein, providing for revenues and appropriations in a total amount of \$236,000.
- (i) Further, there is hereby adopted a Hospitality Fund budget for the City of Florence for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2022, and ending June 30, 2023, as filed in the office of the City Clerk which is hereby incorporated by reference as if set forth fully herein providing for revenues and appropriations in the total amount of \$4,881,500. Authorized as part of this ordinance and incorporated into the Hospitality Fund budget is a commitment by the City of Florence to contribute to the operations and maintenance costs of the Florence County Museum for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2022, and ending June 30, 2023, and for future fiscal years through June 30, 2025 pursuant to the Memorandum of Understanding Between Florence County and the City of Florence dated April 25, 2013.

# Section 2

In accordance with § 6-1-320 of the South Carolina Code of Laws (as amended), a tax for general operating purposes for the period from July 1, 2022, and ending June 30, 2023, for the sums and in the amount hereinafter mentioned, is and shall be levied, collected and paid into the treasury of the City of Florence for the operational use and service thereof. A tax of fifty nine and one-tenth (59.1) mills upon each one dollar (\$1.00) in value of real estate and personal property of every description owned and used in the City of Florence, South Carolina, is and shall be levied and paid into the City treasury for the credit to the City of Florence for the corporate purposes, improvements, and for the purpose of paying current operating expenses of said municipality. Such tax, set at the same operating millage rate as the previous fiscal year, is levied on property assessed for taxation for County and State purposes.

# Section 3

In accordance with of § 6-1-320 of the South Carolina Code of Laws (as amended), a tax for general obligation bond indebtedness for the period from July 1, 2022, and ending June 30, 2023, for the sums and in the amount hereinafter mentioned, is and shall be levied, collected and paid into the treasury of the City of Florence for the purpose of meeting general obligation bond debt service requirements. A tax of up to, but not exceeding, four

(4.0) mills upon each one dollar (\$1.00) in value of real estate and personal property of every description owned and used in the City of Florence, South Carolina, is and shall be levied and paid into the City treasury for the credit to the City of Florence for the purpose of providing and paying for general obligation bond debt of the municipality. Such tax is levied on property that is assessed for taxation for County and State purposes.

### Section 4

In accordance with § 23-47-10 through § 23-47-80 of the South Carolina Code of Laws (as amended), and § 14-93 through § 14-98 of the City of Florence, SC Code of ordinances (as amended), funding is and shall be provided to allow for the operation, maintenance, and enhancements of the E-911 system through a monthly charge of seventy-seven cents (\$0.77) upon each local exchange access line in the area served by or which would be served by the E-911 service and/or system of the City. Such charges are specifically enforceable under § 23-47-50 (B) of the SC Code of Laws. E-911 fees collected by the City of Florence shall be used to fund the acquisition of Police and Fire communications equipment in compliance with § 23-47-40 (B) of the South Carolina Code of Laws, as amended.

# Section 5

The City Manager shall administer the budget and may authorize the transfer of appropriate funds within and between departments as necessary to achieve the goals of the budget. The City Manager is authorized to assign fund balance intended to be used for specific purposes.

### Section 6

The City Manager or his designee is authorized to execute all necessary documents relating to the lease-purchase financing of equipment specifically authorized in the budget as presented or amended by City Council for fiscal year beginning July 1, 2022, and ending June 30, 2023. This action further constitutes a resolution of City Council authorizing and approving such equipment for lease-purchase acquisition, and this ordinance shall serve as representation of this resolution.

# Section 7

If for any reason, any sentence, clause, or provision of this Ordinance shall be declared invalid, such shall not affect the remaining provisions thereof.

# Section 8

That all ordinances or parts of ordinances conflicting with the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed, insofar as the same affect this Ordinance.

# Section 9

That this Ordinance shall become effective on July 1, 2022.



# Incident to adoption of this Resolution, City Council ("Council") makes the following findings of fact:

- 1. Effective May 1, 2022 the City is leasing its new municipal baseball stadium to SRO Partners Florence LLC to facilitate the use of the stadium by the Florence Flamingos, a summer collegiate baseball team affiliated with the Coastal Plain League.
- 2. The Florence Flamingos have successfully operated in the Florence area as the Florence Red Wolves for many years, and they are now under a new ownership group and are moving into the new stadium.
- 3. To successfully market the team, the new ownership group is utilizing limited areas of the stadium for specialized seating and entertainment, and they wish to make an application to the South Carolina Department of Revenue to seek licensure that will allow liquor drinks to be served and consumed in limited access areas designated as the beer garden, the picnic area, and the Stadium Sky Shot areas.
- 4. We are informed and believe that such licensure is allowed under the applicable South Carolina laws and regulations, but that decision is governed solely by the South Carolina Department of Revenue.

## NOW, THEREFORE, BASED UPON THE FINDINGS OF FACT REFERENCED AND SET OUT ABOVE, IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FLORENCE, SOUTH CAROLINA AS FOLLOWS:

- a. The City hereby authorizes SRO Partners Florence LLC to seek the abovedescribed licensure provided that any service and sales of alcoholic beverages at the stadium must be done in strict compliance with the licensure issued by the South Carolina Department of Revenue.
- b. This resolution shall become effective immediately upon its adoption by City Council.
